




We have provided these instructions for the apathetic students of LSU who don't know how to properly fold a paper airplane.




Start with paper in portrait orientation




Fold in half lengthwise




Fold the upper edges to the centerline




Fold the triangle downwards along its lower edge



Fold the tip of the triangle up to the top to locate the halfway point, then unfold



While firmly holding the center in place, fold both upper corners to the halfway point



Fold the remaining tab up as far as it will go. It should slightly overlap the previous fold



Fold in half along the centerline, with the tab on the outside



Fold one wing such that the Outer edge is brought colinear with the plane's centerline



Fold the otherwing in asymmetrical fashion

Flying tips:

Throw the plane, holding it by the tab, throw it directly forward but give the wings a small upward angle of attack. If the plane climbs, stalls and crashes, curl the rear wingtips slightly downward. If the plane rapidly nosedives, curl the rear wingtips slightly upward.





Oil Spill

On April 20, an oil rig 50 miles southeast of Venice, Louisiana had an explosion. The rig, Deepwater Horizon, caught fire, capsized and sank. Eleven platform workers went missing and seventeen were injured. The deepwater drilling platform was under a BP contract. The early estimates of how much oil has spilt into the Gulf of Mexico were debatable. At the time of print, several response techniques have failed to contain the oil.

Several LSU entities have been involved with the response effort. The School of the Coast and Environment, LSU Wildlife Hospital, LSU Earth Scan Lab and LSU Disaster Science Management have been involved in protecting Louisiana's coast and environment.






 \mathcal{L} SU's campus encompasses over 250 main buildings on 2,000 acres. The buildings are Italian Renaissance style, with stucco walls, red roofs and 14thcentury style columns and arches. The Ólmsted Brothers from Massachusetts designed the original campus plan, however, architect Theodore Link took over the plan and designed today's campus. In 2001, LSU began construction on the 40-year-old Union. The project is projected to cost \$83.7 million. This year McDonalds, Einstein Bros. Bagel, Live Oak Lounge and the billiards room opened on the ground floor.

The 2009 LSU football season officially began **L** on Sept. 5, when LSU faced Washington in Husky Stadium in Seattle. But the 2009 season really started months before. The Tigers' coaching staff got quite the facelift - three new assistant coaches were hired. The crown jewel was John Chavis, the lifelong Tennessee defensive coordinator.

LSU roared to a 5-0 start in 2009, outscoring its opponents 135-74 in the process. The start was highlighted by a 20-13 win against Georgia in Sanford Stadium in Athens, Ga., where senior running back Charles Scott broke through a season-long slump on his way to 95 yards and the game-winning touchdown with 46 seconds left in the game. The win kept LSU at No. 4 in the rankings.

The Tiger offense barely fought the Gator defense. The offensive dismay ruined a strong defensive effort from the Tigers, who held 2007 Heisman Trophy winner Tim Tebow and the Florida offense to 13 points. Things turned around quickly against Auburn and Tulane, whom LSU outscored by a combined 63 points. LSU dismantled Auburn, 31-10, then rolled to a 42-0 victory against the Green Wave a week later. In a physical battle that featured a number of tough injuries, including a seasonending collarbone fracture for Scott, Alabama outdueled LSU, 24-15, thanks to several memorable moments.

With the Crimson Tide driving again, the Tigers thought they had what looked like an interception by sophomore cornerback Patrick Peterson. After a long debate by officials, Peterson was ruled out of bounds, the play an incomplete pass.

LSU struggled to beat Louisiana Tech, 24-16, and fell to Ole Miss, 25-23, after an infamous failed final drive.

Jefferson was told to spike the ball, which ran out the one second left on the clock. "I can only tell you that the management at the back end of the game was the issue," Miles said. "It's my fault that we didn't finish first."

LSU salvaged a win the following week by beating Arkansas, 33-30 in overtime, thanks to a drive at the end of regulation that tied the game with four seconds left. The win helped launch LSU into the Capital One Bowl against Penn State on New Year's Day in Orlando, Fla.

The bowl game was ugly from start to finish, with rain that ruined the field. The Tigers and Nittany Lions slipped through the mud and the rain in a mistake-filled game.

Chavis was offered a lucrative contract by Georgia to fill its defensive coordinator position. He chose to stay, and he was rewarded with a raise of \$225,000.

Tennessee wide receivers coach Frank Wilson and Florida wide receivers coach Billy Gonzales were hired to replace Larry Porter and D.J. Mc-Carthy. Porter was hired as head coach at Memphis, while McCarthy resigned on Dec. 9.

1/2 cup salad oil 1/2 cup flour

Main Ingredients

1.5 lbs. fresh or frozen okra

2 quarts hot water

2 lbs. raw shrimp, peeled

I lb. claw crab meat

I pint oysters

I lb. crawfish tails

Hot, cooked rice

Seasonings

I lg. onion, chopped

I bell pepper, chopped

2-3 garlic cloves, minced

One I lb. canned tomatoes

3.5 tbsp. salt

3/4 tsp. red pepper

I lg. bay leaf

1/4 tsp. thyme

8-10 allspice berries


Few grains chili pepper

1/2 cup chopped green onion

1/2 cup chopped parsley

Make a dark roux of the oil and flour in a large heavy pot. Add the onion, bell pepper and garlic. Cook slowly until the onion is transparent. Add undrained tomatoes and cook on low heat until oil rises to the top (about 30 minutes) stirring often. In a separate skillet, fry okra in a little oil on moderately high heat, stirring constantly until okra is no longer stringy. Add the okra to the other mixture, stir and simmer about 10 minutes. Add water, salt and pepper. Simmer partially covered for 45-50 minutes. Add other seasonings and simmer an additional 20 minutes. Add shrimp and crawfish and simmer 15 minutes; then add picked crab meat, simmering 15 more minutes. Add the oysters the last 5 minutes of cooking. Taste carefully for seasonings, add more if necessary, to taste. Remove from fire and stir in green onion and parsley. Serve over rice, you may add different seafood, poultry or sausages for variety. Serves 8 to 10.







Gamma Zeta is also proud of their achievements and works hard everyday to uphold the high ideals set forth by their founders while forming everlasting bonds with their sisters.











Socially, the ladies participate in several sisterhood activities throughout the year including birthday dinners, Big Sis/Lil Sis, and fun Fridays.











Kappa Delta





Celebrations such as the fall welcome dance and other get-togethers, including Dwali and other festival events, give new students a chance to mingle and adapt to the LSU atmosphere.





Ethel Hedgeman Lyle intended to provide stimulation through interaction with friends. After her incorporation in 1913, Alpha Kappa Alpha became a channel for college women to improve the conditions of their city, state, nation, and the world.

In 1971 Emma Dee Jenkins created a chapter on LSU's campus. On December 2, 1972 in the Cotillion Ballroom, 12 women chartered the Eta Kappa Chapter.

The Eta Kappa Chapter participates in hundreds of hours of community service every year. The chapter has partnerships with the Boys and Girls Club, Susan G. Komen Race For The Cure, and many other service organizations.

Alpha Kappa Alpha's Kelsey Davis was named Miss LSU-USA on March 21. 2010. She is the second African American woman to receive this honor. She will be competeing for Miss Louisiana USA in fall 2010.






LSU Rowing

I received much feedback (mainly criticism) for the changes that I did not decide nor want. Even with two years of experience, nothing prepared me for how difficult this year would be.


I didn't find videographers until October and we didn't consistently have the right equipment to make a DVD of high quality. We thought we had more time to get more high quality footage as well as a better variety of music, but then we were unexpectedly told to finish everything over Spring Break. I'd like to thank Jordan and Philip for giving up their Spring Break to finish the DVD as best as they could. Then, we were told to put them in boxes around campus during Dead Week and Finals. All of this was in addition to selling the book and making the book with my small staff of about 10.

It really broke my heart to have people reconsider getting a yearbook (made for them) because they didn't have \$50. From mid-March to the end of April, we were forced to take a hiatus from making the book just to focus on sales. We received support from friends of the Gumbo and my MKT 3421 Promotions class under Dr. Judith Folse. From word of mouth, Facebook, postcards, ads in the Reveille, broadcast e-mails and more, we were able to sell over a thousand. The goal was achieved, but when I compare that number to the 3000+ 2009 Gumbos we distributed in the fall, it's upsetting.

It became economically unfeasible to continue relying on the Gumbo fee to pay for thousands of Gumbos only to have about half of them picked up. As far as I know, \$50 is a reasonable price for a book when you take the cost of the book, tax and S & H into account. However, in all honesty, the administration needs to think harder for a better solution because the students should have their yearbook without restrictions. If they don't pick up the book, then that is their choice, but I don't want to hear people say, "Do I have \$50 now to buy a book that will be important in the future?"

Anyway, I'd like to thank Julie for being the best managing editor ever. Erin, although just a freshman, did an amazing job designing the book with Nikki's help. To the three amigos, Robert, Martin and Grant, y'all really brought out the maternal side in me. Kudos to Paige for being the only photographer without temporary ADD during the photo meetings. I'd also like to thank Chris for providing great sports photos! Shout outs to anyone I missed!
